Oxford is a small community of only about 18 square miles, surrounded by low traffic rural roads. The Oxford cycling club has regular road rides most weeknights and weekends that typically range from 15-50 miles at a variety of paces. Oxford is a popular destination for cyclists from Jackson, MS and Memphis, TN among other places for a weekend get away in a great little college town with great riding.

Phase 1 of the oxford pathways project is a railway conversion that is currently in the construction phase and will be complete in June 2007. There are 3 miles of paved mixed-use pathways through the center of town and the University that are linked to 4 miles of hard surface trail south of town in a 450 acre wooded area owned by the University. A network of mountain bike trails - the "Old Taylor" trails originates at the railway. The railway has traditionally been used by walkers, bikers, the University Cross Country team. The pathways project will introduce this beautiful area to a wider segment of the Oxford population.

The local cycling club, Oxford Cycling, http://groups.google.com/group/OxfordCycling has regular week night and weekend rides at a variety of speeds and skill levels. There are both mountain bike and road rides, newcomers are welcome, a fair amount of informal education goes on during these rides. The Oxford Pathways committee has open monthly meetings to discuss ped/bike issues. Some very large turnouts (30 to 50) came during the planning stages of the railway conversion with a lively discussion between hikers, cross country runners and cyclists on the trail surface choices for a wooded stretch of trail south of town. To celebrate the opening of our Rail/Trail conversion and help set priorities we are having a series of community rides to educate, encourage and get feedback on future projects.

The city of Oxford has just received a 2.4 million dollar enhancement grant from the state to improve bicycle and pedestrian facilities. Scope of work to be determined. The Oxford Pathways Committee which has been operating as an informal advisory board to the Mayor and city planner, will be formally incorporated as a City Commission, with support from city staff, funding for ongoing projects and advisory input into city planning, transportation and recreation policy.

What are the three primary reasons your city deserves to be designated as a Bicycle Friendly Community? Reason One:

The Mayor and the city administration are committed to maintaining the small-town feel of Oxford, in the face of tremendous pressure for growth. The city and the University along with an active group of citizen-volunteers have worked for many years to plan and secure funding for the rail/trail conversion project. This project is finally underway and we are committed to maintaining the momentum to educate the citizens of Oxford to the enjoyment and practicality of travel by bike. We feel that we have an excellent start on infrastructure improvements and now need to recruit, educate and encourage the citizens of oxford to use our dedicated bicycle facilities and to gain the fitness, bike skills and courage to ride in their neighborhoods and across town. Designation of Oxford as a bike friendly community will aid in shifting the public perception of cycling away from a terribly risky and odd behavior, to an enjoyable and practical pursuit.

What are the three primary reasons your city deserves to be designated as a Bicycle Friendly Community? Reason Two:

A network of bike paths is perfectly in keeping with the traditional, casual pace of life here and will reduce the increasingly frustrating problems with traffic. The draw of the car-culture is strong however, designation of Oxford as a bike friendly community will allow us to attract like-minded green developers to help us maintain our green space and oppose the suburban sprawl that is so typical of many American communities.

What are the three primary reasons your city deserves to be designated as a Bicycle Friendly Community? Reason Three:

Oxford really is a great place to ride a bike. Several members of the cycling community have come here from places more well known for their "bike-culture". A colleague at the University who came from Madison Wisconsin said "Oxford is a better place to ride, people just don't know it". The climate here is conducive to safe and comfortable riding 12 months of the year, the scale of the town is only 3 or 4 miles across. The terrain is beautiful, rolling hills, relatively undeveloped. Designating Oxford as a bicycle friendly city will help us spread the word. University of Mississippi athletic and cultural events make Oxford a popular destination for folks from throughout the state. We hope to set a shining example, for one of the poorest, least educated, most overweight states in our country of how communities can flourish and benefit from wise bicycle and pedestrian policy.

Better coordination between City, County and University administrators.

What are the three aspects of your community most in need of improvement in order to accommodate bicyclists? Number Two Aspect:

Increase educational awareness to the benefits of using bicycles as a means of transportation. Better outreach to the economically disadvantaged in our community, from "starving artists", to students and local residents. Getting the word out that Oxford's increasingly expensive housing market is suddenly more affordable if they can take advantage a cheap, safe, reliable and healthy form of transportation.
